

National Chengchi University College of Education Regulations for the Five-Year Integrated Bachelor's-Master's Degree Program

Approved by the 51st College Affairs Meeting on September 21, 2011

Last Amended on October 16, 2023

Article 1

To encourage outstanding undergraduate students of the College of Education (hereinafter referred to as "the College") to continue their studies in the College's Master's programs, cultivate high-caliber talent, promote continuous learning, and shorten the duration of undergraduate and graduate studies—thereby enabling earlier entry into the workforce or further academic pursuits—these Regulations are hereby established.

Article 2

Undergraduate students of the College who have completed five semesters of study and ranked within the top 30% of their class in each semester, or who have demonstrated other forms of excellent academic performance, may apply to the College for admission as prospective Master's students through a pre-admission screening process.

Article 3

Applicants shall submit the following materials for review:

1. Application form
2. Academic transcripts and class rank certification
3. Autobiography and study plan
4. Letters of recommendation
5. Any other documents that support the application

Article 4

The College shall establish a review committee to evaluate applicants based on academic performance and related materials, selecting candidates based on merit. Applications are accepted before the end of April and October each year. The list of admitted candidates shall be announced before the end of May and November, respectively, to facilitate course selection.

Article 5

Students granted pre-admission status to the Master's program must obtain their Bachelor's degree before the end of their undergraduate study period. After successfully passing the entrance examination or screening process for any of the

College's Master's programs (including departments, institutes, or degree tracks) and being formally admitted as graduate students, they may apply for credit transfer in accordance with these Regulations.

Article 6

Students with pre-admission status may take Master's-level courses offered by the College during their fourth year of undergraduate study. Courses completed with a grade of 70 or above may be applied toward the Master's degree after the student is officially enrolled as a graduate student. A maximum of one-half of the total required credits for the Master's degree may be waived in this manner. However, any credits already counted toward the Bachelor's degree requirements may not be counted again toward the Master's degree.

Article 7

These Regulations shall take effect upon approval by the College Affairs Meeting and ratification by the University's Academic Affairs Meeting. Any amendments shall follow the same procedure.
